### Meetings

There were nine meetings held (on January 18th, February 15th, March 15th, April 12th, May 24th, October 18th, November 8th, November 22d, and December 20th).

The total attendance was 86 (including 6 visitors) Mr. Bailey and Mr. N.P.Stockwell attended all nine meetings. Other more or less regular attendants were:

At the November 8th meeting, a motion to hold two meetings each month was tabled until the meeting of November 22d, when the motion was voted down. The minutes state that it was "found that as some members were too busy to spare two nights and as two members had to travel eight miles each to a meeting and one thirty miles, it was not very advantageous". Mr. Barnum said, in Garfield-Perry Club News, 36 years afterward, "The west-side members objected to making such a long ride so often."

# Exchange Department

In April, a letter was received from the San Francisco Philatelic Club, expressing a wish to enter into exchange relations with Garfield-Perry; but Secretary Stockwell was instructed to advise the San Francisco Club "that on account of the distance, it was not thought best to join their circuit."

# Proposed Purchase of U.S.Columbian Stamps by the Club for sale to members

The issuance of the U.S.Columbian stamps naturally created much interest among the members; and, as several expressed a wish for a cencelled set, the Secretary was directed at the March meeting, to secure quotations on sets from several large dealers at home and abroad. At the October meeting. the Secretary reported having written to three English firms, one French, one Swiss and about fifteen American forms, and having received quotations, the lowest of which (received from a Louisville form) was \$13.25.

There is not record of any purchase of these stamps by the Club -- possibly the price asked was deemed too high.

### American Philatelic Association

There was some dissatisfaction on account of the deliay of the A.P.A. Board in confirming the election of Mr. Bailey as Resident Vice President; and, at the Januart meeting, the Secretary was instructed to write the Board for an explanation. Brodie, Wilcox and N.P.Stockwell signed applications for membership in the national society.

The new charter for the Cleveland branch of the A.P.A. was exhibited at the March meeting.

At the October meeting, the Secretary was instructed "to ascertain from Mr. Davison how many MEMBERS A.P.A. members the Club contained and why A.P.A. members from our district should be elected without any consultation with our Resident Vice-President whose office is for that purpose."

## Contributions to the A.P.A. Exhibit at the Chicago World's Fair

The American Philatelic Association arranged for an exhibit of stamps at the Chicago World's Fair; and solicited financial aid and donations of stamps. The Club contributed \$5.00; six individual members (their names are not recorded), contributed \$1.00 each; Messrs. J.V.Painter and Geo.H.Worthington, \$25.00 each -- total \$61.00.
