## Officers and Committees

There is no record of the names of the other Club officers (Exchange Superintendent, Auction Manager, etc.) nor of the personnel of any committee.

## Changes in Membership

The year was not a successful one, so far as growth in membership was concerned; as there was a net loss of two members.

Four new members were admitted, as follows:

Bruce, manager, Provident Act #125 Life Assurance Society; Director in 1906; Vice President in 1908; President in 1909; Director, Librarian, etc. in later years; resigned 1919; died 1934, (about 33400 ale an 1905)

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## Changes in Member ship (continued)

There is no doubt that there were some losses, but, as was the case in so many of the early years, no record was made in the minutes of any members who were dropped for non-payment of dues. The Secretary's Annual Report to the Club for 1905 shows a total membership of 60 at the end of the year, and as the total at the beginning of the year was very likely 59, it is evident that there was a loss of at least three members. More likely it was four.

It seems very probable that the following delinquent members who owed for at least two years dues (according to the Treasurer's "Cash Book") were dropped for non-payment of dues:

The foregoing changes result in no net loss and no net gain; which would leave a total of 59 members at the end of 1905, the same as at the beginning of the year. The Secretary's Annual Report for 1905 shows that the total was 60 at the end of the year; but it is extremely probable that he overlooked the dropping of one of the four members.
