# Anniversary Celebration

Bruce, Rhodes and Crowell were the Committee which made the arrangements for the banquet held to celebrate the 16th anniversary, on March 16, at the Colonial Hotel.

The records show that the following seventeen members were present: Arter, Barnum, Bruce, Comstock, Crowell, L.G.French, Goodm Howe, Kendel, Kinnicutt, Langdon, Rhodes, Schneider, Tubman, Vorce, Waterbury, and Weigel.

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### Enter tainment

At the last meeting in 1905, President-elect Good appointed a special committee (Barnum, Crowell, Kinnicutt, Stahle and Rhodes) to make arrangements for a lecture to be given early in 1906 by J. Murray Bartels of Boston.

Printed invitations were sent out, reading as follows:

Cleveland, O., December 30, 1905.

Dear Sir:

You are cordially invited to attend a Lecture to be given by Mr. J.Murray Bartels, of Boston, Mass., which will be of great benefit to everyone interested in the collection of postage stamps. The Lecture is given under the auspices of the Garfield-Perry Stamp Club, of this city, and will take place Friday evening, January 5th, 8:00 p.m. at Room 501 Caxton Building.

Mr. Bartels is a philatelist of considerable renown, having had charge of the United States Postal Exhibit at the Pan-American Exposition in 1901, and also at the St. Louis Exposition in 1904. During a recent trip abroad he had the pleasure of inspecting the collections of many of the most prominent philatelists in Europe.

A souvenir in the form of a photo reproduction of an original envelope bearing two of the rarest stamps in existence, the original of which is owned in Cleveland and valued at \$5,000, will be presented to everyone in attendance. Various philatelic literature will also be distributed.

No admittance will be charged. The object of the meeting being simply to afford collectors in the city of Cleveland an opportunity to become acquainted with one another for their mutual benefit.

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## Entertainment (continued)

The souvenir distributed on January 5 was a post-card reproduction of a cover postmarked, "Honolulu Oct 4 U.S.Postage Paid", and bearing a two-cent and a five-cent Hawaiian Missionary, as well as a pair of United States 3¢ 1851s. This cover was in the collection of Mr. Worthington.

On February 15, all but one of the members at the meeting, each exhibited ten stamps from his collection. The minutes state that "many interesting and valuable stamps were in evidence".

On March 8, Langdon exhibited his collection. An auction sale of 56 was held on April 19.

A guessing contest on November 1 and another exhibition on the 15th of November completed the special entertainment provided in 1906

# Change in procedure for electing Club officers

prior to 1906, the officers of the Club were elected by direct vote of the members present at the annual meetings.

This practice was changed at the annual meeting of December 20, 1906, when officers for 1907 were chosen. The minutes show that after Waterbury, Wilson, Field, Kinnicutt, Good, Kendel and Weigel had been elected Directors, they "held a meeting and elected Mr. J.R.Wilson President, Mr. C.E.Kendel Vice President and Mr. A.W.Weigel Secy & Treasurer."

Since that time, the President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer have not been elected by direct vote of the members; but have been chosen by the members of the Board of Directors (or Trustees).

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## Club Library

During the year, the library was added to by the purchase of the first volume of "ALBUM WEEDS" at an expense of \$1.68.

## Publicity

At the meeting of November 1, the Secretary was authorized to contribute \$5.00 to the "Nat'l Stamp Com. Campaign" (The Club contributed \$10.00 to this campaign in 1905).

### American Philatelic Association

The Club took no part in A.P.A. affairs. The number of A.P.A. members in Cleveland, however, increased to nine (Barnum, Bierman, Crowell, Good, Jenkins, Kendel, Langdon, Rhodes and Worthington)
