Changes in Membership

Vice-President 1919; President for two terms 1920 and 1921; made an honorary life member in 1934. One of the best-known and most colorful members the Club ever had.

Jan 21 John Lehr (then about 47 yrs. old) Act #168

A druggist on the west side of Cleve
land; former charter member #14; he
attended 11 meetings in 1909; but
lost interest; was dropped in 1913.

A salesman; he attended five meetings; one each in 1909, 1910, 1911, 1912 and 1913; resigned in 1913.

" Chas. Kramer Kamms, O. Act #170

He took a rather active interest in

A philatelic publisher ("Fowler's Stamp & Coin Age", etc); dropped in 1913; reinstated 1915; resigned 1916.

Meetings and Attendance

Sixteen regular meetings were held, all on Thursday nights, except four (March 31, April 21, May 5, and May 19) which, for some unrecorded reason, were held on Wednesday nights.

The attendance broke all records, there being a total of 363, not including visitors. The average attendance per meeting was a little less than 23. The attendance was remarkably consistent, the best-attended meeting being attended by 29, while the meeting with the smallest attendance was attended by 18.

Of other veteran members, George Bailey did not attend any meeting, nor did Brodie. Oliver S.Hart attended one; Kress, none; Worthington, the Anniversary meeting only; Tubman, one; Prescott, none; Pears, one.

During the year, quarters were changed twice. The two January meetings were held at 1429 Williamson Building. At the January 21 meeting, a committee (Waterbury, Rust and Beatty) was appointed to "investigate possible sites for the meetings". At the next meeting (on February 4), Rust reported for the committee that several sites had been inspected,

and that the rooms of the Ad. Clubm in the Hollenden Hotel seemed most desirable, but the Committee had been unable to secure a definite proposition from the Ad. Club. The Committee reported again, at the February 18 meeting, that nothing definite had been done.

The two February meetings and the meeting of March 4 were held at 1301 New England Building, the office of Fred Bruce. At the March 4 meeting, Beatty reported, for the Committee, that a desirable room had been found at #202 The Arcade, which could be secured at #200 per might. The Club decided to contract for the room and hold future meetings there.

The next regular meeting -- on March 31 -- was held in the new room in The Arcade, and all of the subjection meetings in 1909.

Anniversary Celebration

The nineteenth anniversary was celebrated by a banquet at the Colonial Hotel on March 17. George Worthington was the guest of the evening. He made a talk, telling the reasons that started him in collecting stamps, and the pleasure he derived from his collections. He exhibited four of his greatest rarities — the one-penny and two-pence Post Office Mauritius and two of the Alexandria Postmaster provisional stamps. There were thirty-five members and guests present, including Iver Johnson of Chicago, Percival Parrish and Jos. Steinmetz of Philadelphia, and Lozier of New York.

Rust, Barnum, Taite and Good comprised the Committee which arranged the details of the celebration.

Entertainment at Regular Meetings

The Entertainment Committee was unusually active during 1909, and arranged for special exhibits and other entertainment at practically each meeting.

There were three outstanding exhibits, as follows:

- Mar 4 Mlvin Good exhibited Chas. L. Pack's Spain
- May 19 Good exhibited Worthington's U.S. essays and die proofs. Rust also exhibited his United States, and Beatty exhibited his U.S.
- Sep 16 Myron Wilson exhibited his United States(including the 1869 and 1901 inverts). Crowell, Schneider and Weigel also exhibited U.S. Revenues.

Changes in the Constitution and By-Laws

During the first part of the year, the Constitution was amended to provide for a minimum age of 17 years for members (there had previously been no age limit); and to provide for dues of \$2.00 per year for all active members (the previous dues had been \$1.00). This change, however, was not effective until 1910.

Club Library

Good donated two volumes of Stanley Gibbons catalogue.

The New England Stamp Company donated a copy of Crocker's "Hawaiian Numerals". There had been several requests for this book, and, at the meeting of November 4, a collection was made, resulting in ample funds to cover the cost of the book; but, at the next meeting, it was announced that a copy had been donated by The New England Stamp Company.

Donation of stamps by Lewis Hanford and others

At the meeting of rebruary 18, Lewis A. Hanford announced that "he would one of five to donate to the club 500 or more stamps valued at 2¢ or more, proceeds from the sale of which to create a fund to be used in the purchase of collections."

The President appointed a special committee (Hanford, Moses and John Lehr) to look after this matter.

American Phiadetic Society

The Cleveland Branch of the A.P.S., formed in 1908, while separate from Garfield-Perry, was composed mostly of Garfield-Perry members. The A.P.S. membership in Cleveland increased from 28 in 1908 to 37 in 1909.

Election of Officers for 1910

At the November 18 meeting, a Nominating Committee composed of Barnum, Hanford, Schneider, Wood and Rhodes, was appointed to select twelve candidates for the seven Directors to be elected for 1910. This was the first time a Nominating Committee had been appointed.

The annual election on December 16 resulted in the following being elected to serve in 1900:
