Dr. Hennan was the principal speaker at the banquet, his subject being "Philately - in General and Specialized" President Green was Toastmaster and with him at the speakers! table were Dr. Hennan, W.T.Poppenger, George Linn, Alvin Good, A.D.Fennel, Adolph Steeg, W.W.MacLaren, M.J.Lloyd, Lewis A.Hanford and W.H.Barnum. MacLaren spoke on "The Club's Birthday.".

Ascording to an article which appeared in The American Philatelist for May, 1932:

"Entertainment features included delightful songs by Raoul Bonanno and his students, and the demonstration of a marvelous apparatus for detecting the truth or untruth of statements made by persons tested by the machine. D.F.Lybarger, suitably disguised as the scientific inventor, called upon several members of the party to take part in the demonstration and lementably the indicator finally worked around to 'Damn Liar' in every case."

The above-mentioned article shows the names of seventy-nine out-of-town guests who were among those who registered." The banquet was attended by 126.

## Entertainment at Regular Meetings

Special exhibits, talks, etc., were provided at twenty-three regular meetings.

Mr. O.H.Wolcott's exhibit of Bannock City Express covers was the outstanding exhibit and talk of the year. Mr. John S.Campbell's exhibit of illustrated (corner card) covers from 1890 on was also of special interest.

Mr. E.A.Beck conducted an open forum at one meeting, at which each member present stated his reasons for preferring his favorite stamp.

A special visit was made to Rubber City Stamp Club at Akron on Frbruary 11th, and a Junior night was held on May 13th.

Mr. Lybarger gave an unusually interesting and informative illustrated talk on the United States surface printed stamps on December 16th.

A bridge party was held on July 15th to raise funds for the expenses of the Official Club delegate to the A.P.S.convention.

The annual member's competitive exhibit was held on December 23rd.

In making the usual appointments at the beginning of the year, President Green did not appoint an Auctioneer; but designated the Club auctions as entertainment, in charge of the Entertainment Committee, the plan being to hold one auction each month.

Ten auctions were held, including two donation auctions for the benefit of the "A.P?S.delegate fund".

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## The Club Library

Librarian Stevens made special efforts to stimulate the interest of the members in the Club library. On several occasions, he brought books, particularly new acquisitions, to club meetings, and urged members to take them home for perusal. This resultate in a desirable increase in the use of the library by the members; but also was the cause of some confusion in the library records.

In his Annual Report to the Club for 1932, Mr. Stevens reported that several valuable additions had been made during the year, notably Luff's book on United States stamps, Stanley Aghbrook's book on the 1-cent stamp of 1851, and Volume I of King and Johl's work on U.S. Twentieth Century stamps.

His report also stated that by purchase of missing numbers, the Club had completed Volumes III, IV and V of The Collectors Club Philatelist and had the first nine volumes of that magazine either bound or ready to bind.

He credited Mr. Green with the acquistion of the Luff book; and various other members, particularly Messrs. Barnum, Grieve, Finlayson and Molitor, with interesting contributions to the library and archives of the Club.

### Purchase of exhibition Frames

It was found that additional exhibition frames would be required for the 42d anniversary celebration exhibit. The design and expense was given careful consideration and fifty new frames were purchased in February at \$2.00 each. Of these, thirty were subscribed and paid for by individual club members; the other twenty were Club property.

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## Propoded Northern Ohio Phileatlic Association

Early in the year, the Sandusky Stamp Club sponsored a proposal for a "Northern Ohio Philatelic Association" and endeavored to interest Garfield-Perry in it. The proposal was discussed at the Club meeting of April 1st and the minutes of that meeting contain the following:

"Mr. Poppenger appeared to address the Board on the subject of the proposed Northern Ohio Philatelic Association, spondored -- at present -- by the Sandusky Club, and after a general discussion a motion was made by Mr. Lloyd that G.P. take no action without consulting Rubber City Stamp Club, which is the reverse of the message which Mr. Poppenger brought to G.P. April 14th, there is to be a special meeting in Akron to which G.P.members are invited together with the Sandusky Club delegates for discussion of the club suggestion referred to here."

The Sandusky Club was not represented at the meeting of April 14th. "The American Philatelist" for June, 1932 contained the following on this metter:

"G-P and Rubber City have mutually agreed to take no part in any plan which will interfece with the success of the Rubber City Open House in December, or the G-P anniversary celebration in March of each year. If a district association is organized, therefore, it will need to be set up in such a way, as not to clash with those two stated events, if it is to interest the A.P.S.units in Cleveland and Akron."

The minutes of G-P meeting of August 26th state:

"Preston reported on the meeting at Akron to which Green, Preston and Moore had been designated as a committee to consider an all-Ohio society as suggested by Geo. Linn of Columbus. No progress and nothing definite happened. And the committee does not recommend membership on the part of Garfield-Perry."

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## Participation in American Philatelic Society Affairs

It was decided by the Club to send an official Club delegate to the national A.P.S.convention in Los Angeles, as had been done in 1931.

Mr. Lloyd was appointed the official delegate. The raising of funds for the expense of the trip was accomplished by a bridge party held on July 15th and a donation auction on July 29th. However, it was found that the amounts realized were insufficient; and \$250.00 was therefore borrowed by the Club on demand promissory notes in denominations of one, five and ten dollars. Another donation auction was held on November 4th, which produced almost enough to cover the deficit. The botal expenses amounted to \$257.81. he Treasurer's monthly report for November shows that, at the end of that month, there was a deficit of \$14.06 in the "Official Delegate Fund".

## Club Asccounts

A resolution offered at the first meeting of the year, by Treasurer Lloyd, was adopted, providing for the setting up and maintaining of separate accounts for the Club's funds, as follows:

> Permanent Fund - 35% General Find - 40% Library and Club Property Fund - 10% Entertainment Fund 15%

and it also provided for the allocation of income from dues to those funds as follows:

Permanent Fund - 5% General Fund - 70% Lib.and C.P.Fund 10% Entertainment Fund 15%

W. W. MacLaren gave up his downtown office, and conducted his stamp business thereafter from his home.

perry Hobbs returned to Cleveland from Chicago where he had been for more than a year.

Several members volunteered to assist the Librarian in compiling an index of leading articles in the bound vælumes of philatelic magazines in the Club Library.

On February 11, fifteen G-P members made a visit to the Rubber City Stamp Club at Akron. Those who made the trip were: Preston, Martin, Moore, Sanderson, Lloyd, Hobbs, Grant, Young, Molitor, Holden, Shippen, Stroup, Grieve, Stevens, W.S.Robison and Mrs. W.B. Robison.

A new stamp department in the Cleveland News was started in 1932. It was conducted by Jack Schildhouse.

A picnic was planned for July 10; but for various reasons, plans were abandoned.
