# 46th Anniversary Celebration

# Changes in the Code of Regulations

Messrs. Vance Holden and Jos. Lehman submitted a proposal to amend the Code of Regulations to provide for the increase of the Board of Trustees to nine members, four of whom were to be elected for a term of two years; the other five for a term of one year at the next election -- thereafter, the board members to be rotated on the two-year basis.

Before this was submitted to the members for a vote, however, the provision for two-year terms was elaminated -- leaving the increase in the number of Trustees the only change to be voted on.

The proposed change was approved at the meeting of June 12th.

# Proposal to publish a roster and Code of Regulations

The question of publishing a roster and Code of Regulations was discussed at several meetings.

At the meeting of June 5th, it was decided not to have a printed roster -- on account of the estimated expense of \$95.00 -- but to give further consideration to getting out a mimeographed roster.

At the next meeting, a motion was passed to issue a mimeographed roster at an expense of not to exceed fifty dollars, and the Secretary was directed to assemble the necessary data.

#### Club Bank Account

At the neginning of the year, the Treasurer was instructed to transfer the club funds from a savings account to a checking account; the reason for the change being that the low rate of interest paid on savings accounts did not cover the expense of checks.

# Scott's Catalogue at Club Meetings

Mr. Molitor suggested that a Scott's General Catalgue be provided by the Club and kept available for use at each Club meeting.

This caused considerable dissussion; but it was decided to procure a copy; and Mr. Molitor was appointed custodian, with the duty of seeing that the catalogue was on hand at each meeting.

# National Federation of Stamp Clubs

Mr. Poppenger, who was Regional Director of the N.F.S.C. in 1935, announced at the end of that year, that he would not be a candidate for reelection. Thereupon, Mr. F.W.Green was recommended by the Club as Regional Director for 1936; but, at the meeting of February 7th, Mr. Green requested that his name be withdrawn. This was done, and Mr. Martin's name was recommended, in place of Mr. Green's.

# The Second Philatelic Congress

The success of the First Philatelic Congress, held in 1935, resulted in President Martin's suggestion that the Second Congress be held in Cleveland. After discussion, kkixxthe Club invited the Congress to meet in Cleveland, and in May, Mr. Martin announced that the invitation had been accepted.
