Proposal for Bourse at Club Meetings

At the meeting of September 16th, a suggestion was advanced that a bourse be conducted at the regular club meetings, a charge to be made to dealers for the concession and the number of tables to be limited at each meeting. There was considerable discussion, but no action was taken, and the project was dropped.

Short program in honor of Wm. Imgdon

On November 11th, a short program was held in honor of Mr. Langdon. Comments were made by Mr. Grant of Mr. Langdon's activities in the Club, and by Mr. Good as to various finds made by Mr Langdon. Mr. Langdon was not present at the meeting.

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Fall Open House

At the meeting of September 16th, there was a general discussion as to how the membership could be increased, resulting in several suggestions.

Mr. Grieve suggested that an "Open House" be held some time during October, and a general invitation extended to all collectors in and about Cleveland. This suggestion was well received; but no definite action was taken to make arrangements for an Open House in October.

The proposal was however, kept in mind; and late in October, plans were discussed in detail, and the second week in December was tentatively chosen for the date; but, at the first meeting in November, the date was definitely set for December 2d. An appropriation of not to exceed \$25.00 was authorized for the expense of the event.

Mr. LaGanke was Chairman of the Committee and arranged for series of 4-minute talks on various philatelic subjects, by the following members: Grant, Pforzheimer, Lehman, Sanford, Lybarger, Beck, Holden, Moore, Green, McLoud, Good, and Young. A cup was awarded to the club with the highest percentage of the members present.

An interested crowd of two or three hundred attended -- the event was a great success.

Summer Outing

In May, President Lybarger brought up the question of holding a Club Summer outing. A boat trip to Cedar Point was suggested. Later (on June 17th) a committee (Messrs, Beck, Holden and Jesse) was appointed to arrange an outing; but the project was abandoned.

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Participation in A. P. S. activities

At the meeting of February 11th, the question was discussed as to holding sectional or regional A.P.S. meetings. Sentiment appeared to be generally favorable to the holding of such meetings.

A suggestion was made shortly afterward that the club arrange for a Junior Exhibit at the A.P.S. convention. In May, a committee (Messrs. Martin, Grant and Shoemaker) was appointed to arrange for such an exhibit. It was arranged to have Mr. Tom Moore enter an exhibit, consisting of Swiss semi-postals, U.S.Special Deliveries, and the stamps of Iceland. This won an award.

Late in August, President Lybarger commented on the possibility of Garfield-Perry inviting the A.P.S. to hold its 1941 convention in Cleveland. At the next meeting (on September 2d) it was decided to prepare and send out to G-P and APS members in Cleveland and vicinity, a questionnaire to elicit sentiment as to extending such an invitation. This was done and at the meeting of September 9th, the questionnaires which had been returned at that time, were discussed, and a motion was passed that Garfield-Perry extend the invitation. Mr. Martin arranged to present the invitation.

Mr. Lybarger was requested to exhibit four frames at the convention in New Orleans; Mr.Martin was appointed the official Club delegate.

On December 9th, Mr. Green brought up the question of nomination of candidates for the Board of Vice Presidents of the A.P.S. and suggested Messrs. Lybarger, Martin and Johnson.

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Finances and Accounts

The year seems to have been a successful one, so far as finances were concerned. At the first meeting of the year, the Treasurer reported \$276.50 on hand as of January 1st; his report covering the month of December showed \$356.53 on hand as of January 1, 1939.

At the Board Meeting of January 7th, it was decided to make several changes in the accounting procedure of the Club. It was decided that all Life Membership fees would be placed in the Permanent Fund; and that expenditures from the Permanent Fund would be made for capital account only. It was also decided that the auction, banquet and entertainment funds would be discontinued and merged into the General Fund. A motion was also passed that dues paid by members would be credited to Funds as follows:

General Fund 75% Library Fund 15% Permanent Fund 10%

On June 3rd, a motion was passed that the Treasurer transfer the funds in the Club's bank savings account to a checking account.

Early in September, a motion was passed that the Treasurer prepare a budget for the year 1939, and submit it to the Board of Trustees at their next meeting for discussion. This estimate was made, and the baudget presented at the Board Meeting of October 7th. The record shows that the Board postponed action at that meeting, and there is no further record of action taken; but it is likely that the budget was actually adopted before the end of the year -- or perhaps early in 1939.

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Circulation of A.P.S. Sales Circuits

It had been the custom of Sales Manager Copeland for some time to open the A.P.S. Sales Circuits in his office (at 1227 Prospect Avenue), and to phone certain members of the Club to call at his office to go through the books, if they desired, before the regular Club meeting. This practice resulted in a complaint of favoritism, and the matter was brought to the attention of the Board of Trustees.

Accordingly, at the meeting of April 1st, Mr. Copeland was instruted to open the circuits first at the regular Club meetings, it the circuit arrived during the latter part of the week; to open it for sales in his office only if the Circuit arrived easrly in the week; and to attempt to rotate the calls to members to look over the books in his office.

Club Exhibit Frames

At the meeting of January 14th and 21st, Mr. Shoemaker made an appeal for the assistance of the members in repairing and painting the Club's exhibit frames in preparation for use at the 48th Anniversary Celebration. At the special Board meeting of January 24th, Mr. Shoemaker was authorized to purchase eight frames in addition to those which he had already been authorized to buy.

On Monday night, January 24th, several members worked in the basement of Mr. Shoemaker's store, assisting him in painting and repairing frames. After they had all gone home, fire broke out in the basement, causing complete damage to his stock of goods by smoke and water.

At the next Club meeting (on February 4th) a motion was passed that Mr. Johnson make arrangements for the repair of damaged frames.

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The Lagerloef Cup

At a special Board meeting on January 24th,
Mr. Shoemaker read an offer received from Mr. Hans
Lagerloef, to present a cup to be awarded annually
for the best exhibit, by a Club member, at the
anniversary celebration. Mr. Lagerloef's offer
was accepted; and Messrs. Shoemaker, Moore, Sanderson and Grant were appointed to draft rules for the
competition.

At the meeting of February 25th, the Committee's report was presented by Mr. Moore, who stated that the Committee had made no attempt to formulate permanent rules; but that the regulations recommended were for the 1938 contest only.

At the meeting of March 4th, Messrs. Moore, Grant and Green and Martin were appointed to select judges for the 1938 contest.

After the Anniversary celebration - at which the Cup was awarded to Mr. Lybarger, for his exhibit of United States offset issues - a motion of Mr. Shoemaker's was passed providing that the collection winning the Lagerloef Cup each year be at the disposal of the Board of Trustees for exhibit elsewhere—subject to the consent and approval of the woner.

On June 3rd, Messrs. Shoemaker, Martin and Johnson were appointed a Special Committee to Draft permanent rules for future Lagerloef Cup competition. Late in the year, the Committee's report and recommendations were adopted by the Club.

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The Club Library

Librarian Green made efforts to get all of the material in the Club library indexed. At the Board meeting of February 4th, a motion of Mr. Green's was passed providing that all outstanding books be ordered returned to the library, and that no further books be permitted to be withdrawn pending the completion of the indexing of all publications Also a motion was passed authorizing Mr. Green to purchase such additional book cases as were required.

At the same meeting, Mr. Green read a list of the publications in the philatelic library of the late Mr. Barnum, which were for sale by Mrs.Barnum, and suggested that the list be referred to Col. Kimble for appraisal, so that the Club could make a fair offer for the purchase.

Late in the year, Mr. Green announced the donation of various old Garfield-Perry bulletins and group photographs, the most of the latter by Mr. Frank Grant.

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Proposed Northern Ohio and Western Pennsylvania Federation of Stamp Clubs

On October 14th, a letter was read at the Club meeting from the Mahoning Valley Stamp Club, suggesting an Ohio Federation of Stamp Clubs. A motion was passed that two members of Garfield-Perry be appointed to discuss the proposal with representatives of other clubs at Youngstown on October 28-30. Messrs. LaGanke and Martin were appointed the Club representatives.

At the meeting of November 4th, there was a lengthy discussion of the proposal. It was finally decided that a definite written proposal be required of the promotors, setting forth the rights and obligations of Garfield-Perry if it should join such a Federation; and that no definite action be taken on the proposition by the Garfield-Perry representatives at the time of the conference.

No further action is recorded -- the propsal was no doubt abandoned for lack of support.

Garfield-Perry exhibit at Pittsburgh

The Philatelic Society of Pittsburgh, in making arrangements for its celebration of its Golden Jubilee, in the fall of 1938, announced a competitive exhibit for stamp clubs. At Garfield-Perry's meeting of August 5th, it was decided that the Club would enter a frame in the Pittsburgh exhibit. Mr. Shoemaker was appointed a Committee of One to arrange for the frame.

The exhibit won first prize -- a bell.

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Miscellaneous

At the special Board meeting of January 24th, a motion was passed that the Club use its influence in procuring the issuance of a special set of commemorative stamps for the Worlds Poultry Congress to be held in Cleveland in 1939. It is not recorded that efforts were made by the Club; or the results.

Messrs. Grant, Martin and Lybarger were appointed members of a special committee early in February to appraise the late "Ham" Barnum's collection for his widow.

In July, Mr. Sanford had the misfortune to have his home in Rocky River broken into, and several philatelic items of value stolen. This included a general collection, a collection of mint singles and blocks since 1933, two stock books, and other items valued at about eight hundred dollars.

The Hanford and Lagerloef Cups

The Hanford Cup was awarded to Mr. Martin for his services to the Club during 1937.

The Lagerloef Cup was awarded to Mr. Lybarger for his exhibit of offset printed stamps of the United States.
