# Hi-Hat Auctions

At the suggestion of N.P.LaGanke, a series of monthly "Hi-Hat" auctions to be held at the Club meetings, was inaugurated on May 5. Don Grieve was the auctioneer at the first one.

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on July 7, a motion carried which provided that the "Mint Sheet Brokerage Company be permitted to continue to hold such auctions, and that the sum of \$10.00 be paid hereafter to the Club by the Mint Sheet Brokerage Company for use of the club meetings for holding such auctions."

# Special Publicity

The two radio programs -- in March -- participated in by the Club officers gave the Club some excellent publicity -- particularly the 49th Anniversary celebration.

In addition, Don Martin conducted a series of weekly radio programs about philately in general on station WHK. These were called "Philatelia". Sanford and other members of the Club participated at various times.

# Membership of the Club in the Royal Philatelic Society

A motion carried at the Board meeting of September 1 that "the club contfibute \$5.00 to membership in the Royal Philatelic Society, London; publications of the Society to be turned over to Garfield-Perry Library." The object of the membership was to receive, for the Club library, the London Philatelist.

# Award of Cups

The Hanford Cup was awarded to H. M. Sanford, for his outstanding work as Treasurer for the four years ending in 1938.

The Lagerloff Cup was won by L.D. Shoemaker, for his exhibit of Canada at the 49th Anniversary celebration.

Early in the year, considerable criticism was voiced as to the appearance of the certificates of award given by the Club. It was decided to change the design, and Lyabarger was delegated to draw up a new design. His suggestion was approved, and the old certificate was abandoned.

Later in the year, it was announced that Dr. C.W. Hennan, of Chicago, would present to the Club a cup to be awarded to a member each year for service to Garfield-Perry.

Col. Hans Lagerloef wrote to Shoemaker in November, offering to present a permanent trophy to the Club, to be competed for at the 50th Anniversary Celebration. After considerable discussion, a motion carried that the Club decline the offer, due to inability to arrange for the elaborate competitive exhibit which would be required.

# Junior Committee Activity

Early in the fall, plans were made for considerable activity among the junior collectors of Greater Cleveland. Mark Snow, Chairman of the Junior Committee, appointed Sanford, Tyler, Cook, and LaGanke members of the Committee; and it was planned to have schools, junior stamp clubs, etc., enter elimination competitive exhibits.

Late in the year, however, Snow reported that the juniors had shown very little interest in the plan. Only six clubs had indicated a wish to enter the competition; only ten had responded altogether -- from about 100 schools which had been invited to enter.

# The Club Library

There was considerable activity in the Club library during 1939.

At the first Board meeting of the year, Green suggested the appointment of a Library Committee; and the President appointed Piper and Rankin as members, with a third member to be added later.

Green made much progress in cataloguing and indexing the material in the library. Later in the year, the President appointed Comman and Piper to assist Green in this work.

Numerous donations were made to the library, by Finlayson, Grieve, Pforzheimer, Lybarger, Robison, Martin and others. Martin donated a year's subscription to the "Stamp Specialist". Thirteen volumes of early issues of Mekeel's Stamp News were added. An important purchase was a copy of Howe's "Canada Postage Stamps".

# Changes in Club Regulations

No changes were made in Club regulations in 1939; but, at the first meeting in December, the President appointed Green, Lybarger and Johnson members of a committee to explore the advisability of revising the Code of Regulations.

# American Philatelic Society

Early in 1939, the Club seconded the nominations made by the Gresce to City Stamp Club for officers of the A.P.S. for 1939-41.

Later in the year, a proposal was discussed to invite the A.P.S. to holds its 1941 convention in Cleveland; but it was finally decided not to do so.

Martin, Johnson and Lybarger were elected Vice Presidents of the A.P.S. at the annual convention in 1939.

# Exhibition at Cleveland Union Terminal Station

The Cleveland Post Office celebrated its 135th anniversary in 1939. Postmaster O'Donnell asked the collectors of Cleveland to assist by furnishing exhibits. President Shoemaker and a representative of the Cleveland Precancel Club were appointed to arrange for the exhibits.

H.D.Farnam was appointed by President Shoemaker to mount the Garfield-Perry exhibit.

The exhibits were shown in the concourse of the Cleveland Union Terminal Station during the week of August 11. A short radio broadcast from the concourse featuring the stamp exhibits was made on the night of August 11 -- another on the night of August 18.

### Finances

The finances of the Club were well handled in 1939. At the end of the year, the Club had \$429.57 in its treasury. \$73.04 more than it had at the end of 1938.

A new source of revenue was discovered in the refund of Ohio sales tax stamps. This was due to Don Grieve, who, at the meeting of August 11, suggested that Club members turn in these stamps to the Club. At the meeting of December 29, the Treasurer reported receipt of \$12.00 from that source.

In November, it was decided to consider the value of the Club's Government bond as part of the Permanent Fund in the Treasurer's accounts. Also, it was decided to eliminate from the Treasurer's accounts as uncollectible, the amount of \$8.85 impounded in the Guardian Trust Company Savings Account.

On December 1, Treasurer Cornman was authorized to purchase a \$100.00 U.S. "Baby Bond".

# Advance Arrangements for the Golden Jubilee Party

Early advance preparations were started by the appointment - on April 7 -- of R.E.Johnson as General Chairman.

In August, the date was tentatively set for the last week-end in March 1940. The War Cover Club was invited to hold its annual convention in Cleveland at the time of Garfield-Perry's Golden Jubilee celebration.

An effort was made to have the Post Office Department schedule the Philatelic truck in Cleveland at the time of the Club celebration.

E. N. Moore proposed an elaborate entertainment for the celebration; but the Board decided that the Club was not in financial condition to provide entertainment on the scale proposed.

The fee for bourse tables was set at ten dollars.

W.R.McLoud suggested, on October 20, that efforts be made to have a commemorative stamp issued for the 50th anniversary.

A supply of souvenir labels was arranged for by Don Martin.

### Miscellaneous

On request of Mrs. C.E.Bruce, the Appraisal Committee (Grant, Chairman) appraised the collection of Chas.E.Bruce.

Through the efforts of C.W.Tyler, Postmaster O'Donnell issued special instructions to parcel post employes at the maim Cleveland Post Office and brankes to apply philatelic cancellations to parcel post packages when request for such cancellation is made by the sender, or shown on the package.
