President Tex Smith called the meeting to order at 9:04 AM with nine members and two guests present. Since our regular secretary was missing this evening, we were denied the enforcement of the previous night's minutes.

The first guests were introduced by Tom Nichols and told us of their collecting interests: Dick Stevens while the author of "The Four Great" including Imperf's and Twisted items; George Foster stated his interest, foremost was the Presidential Issue of 1904.

After news of members we passed the black lunch and Bill Gurnett made a long speech and hoped to attend a meeting in the near future. Frank Knuck told us he had visited Kletz recently and took along an ancient book (1722) of Canadian Club that had been gathering dust in Frank's library. Bill seemed to appreciate this friendly gesture.

For the first time in many weeks, Martin Schneider was unable to report any philatelic news but his painful visit was filled by Reg Morris who told us about this Lithuanian political cartoon he had given him some non-Lithuanian labels printed in German to be used as stated when Lithuania became free! No clue was given as how long this might take.

We also showed our first day of issues cancellation items we received as a gift from the Pickens Pattern collector.

There were no auction lots this time and under stamps we wrote as the best, Reg Morris showed: 1. a curious "P&U" described as Czechoslovak Czech-Slovak air Post stamp. 2. two unusual cancellations from Japan in the blue-stamped ink, and 3. an early AM 11 letter from a woman's department store on the Isle of Man. Reg also related the story of how he was able to arrange a visit to the "Imperial" (Military, secret storage room, or what have you) at the Japanese Ministry of Colonization and Foreign. He was especially interested in seeing early revolving machine canons the cast-offs.

Public announcement was received. March Party news was as follows: a was missed by nearly all present.

Bob Steiger provided the entertainment of the evening with a reproduction of his exhibit "Postal History of New Hampshire, 1840's to 1950's". Bob showed about 45 selected items from his collection which will be shown next weekend at Philatelic Show '22, in Exeter, N.H. We saw a rich variety of handstamps, post markings and cancellings, all of which was expertly explained by Bob.
