We're faced on speakers for 5 years: with some more backs, probably years for 10. There was a record number of society presidents and ex presidents at the show. A preliminary accounting shows that the show either lost \$372 or made \$1838, depending on how the accuracy long-term comes. In any case, there is strong evidence that our local appeal is eroding.
