Air Mail Rates from Australia to the United States

One of the challenges of collecting a new specialized area, when you include postal history along with the stamps and their production related material, is to learn the proper postal rates.

Collecting the postal history that reflects the proper usages of the stamps is a great opportunity to enhance and expand these new collections, and this article treats Australian air mails, specifically to the United States.

To date, probably the biggest challenge to this end is to quantify the international air mail rates, especially the early period and the World War II time frame.

The chart at the right is an attempt to simplify this group of rates and present them in a useful format for collectors to use as a resource.

The information comes from three primary sources as listed below. All three turned out to be a bit confusing and incomplete as they existed alone:

- Richard Breckon's five parts series, Australian Commonwealth Postal Rates, 1901-1966 as serialized in The Australian Philatelist journals of November 1987 to Winter, 1989.
- Martin Walker's *Air Mail Postage Rates*, a two volume work published in 1988.
- Airmail Operations During World War II by Thomas H. Boyle, Jr., published in 1998.

A survey of all the air mail covers from Australia to the U.S. that are in my collection to date proved 100% correlation with the chart when it was completed, so if you have a nonconforming cover, please let me know.
