# **March Party shows collecting thrives in Northeast Ohio**

With hundreds of stamp collectors in attendance during its threeday run, March Party 2023 showed again why it is Ohio's premier annual philatelic event.

From newcomers such as Michael Brewer of Berea, who was attending his first stamp show, to John Hotchner, one of the country's best-known philatelists, collectors converged on the Best Western Plus in Strongsville March 17-19 to see long-time friends, make new ones, view top-of-theline exhibits, and add to their collections at the 37-dealer bourse.

Attendance paralleled that of the 2022 show. Guests arrived as much as an hour before the show's Friday opening with steady attendance throughout including much of Sunday.

## Hering, Hotchner garner top March Party awards

James Hering, top, took home top honors in the multiframe category for his exhibit on the 2-cent Harding Memorial Issue of 1923. Meanwhile, John Hotchner, bottom, received the Grand Award winner in the single-frame competition for his exhibit on the development of stamp perforating in 19th-century Great Britain. James Hering received the Grand Award for his multi-frame exhibit "The Two Cent Hardings" at the March Party.

In the single-frame category John Hotchner claimed the Grand Award for his exhibit "The Mid-19th Century Start of Perforating in Great Britain and the United States."

Hering said his exhibit has taken years to complete. He chose the topic, he explained, because he is from Marion, Ohio, Harding's home town.

The exhibit will return to Cleveland later this year as part of the annual Champion of Champions World Series of Philately competition during the Great American Stamp Show Aug. 10-13.

The exhibit also received the Garfield-Perry Award for the best U.S. Exhibit and the American First Day Cover Society Award.

Hotchner will be invited to enter his exhibit into the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors' annual single-frame Champion of Champions competition during Chicagopex 2023, set for Nov. 17-19.

Emory Toops received the Reserve Grand Award for his multi-frame exhibit "The Development and Use of the Provisional Issues of South Vietnam."

He also received the APS Medal of Excellence for 1940-1980, the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors Award of Excellence – Treatment, and the Dale Pulver Award for the Best Foreign exhibit.

The exhibition jury – Elizabeth Hisey, chief judge, Guy Purington, Mark Schwartz, Stephen Suffet, Ken Trettin and Gregg Redner, apprentice – awarded 11 large gold awards, demonstrating the quality of the exhibits on hand this year.
