Got an extra \$1.5 million or so? First piece of mail sent using a pre-paid stamp up for auction

In case you're interested in bidding, a cover from Great Britain recorded as the earliest use of a pre-paid postage stamp will be auctioned Feb. 2 in New York.

Sotheby's will feature the firstuse of a Penny Black that was affixed to a Mulready letter-sheet in its "The One" auction.

The sale traditionally features one-of-a-kind items that attract high-end collectors of art, books, manuscripts, coins, postal history, and other highly sought artifacts.

The cover is estimated at \$1.5 million to \$2.5 million.

It is postmarked May 2, 1840 in London and sent to William Blenkinsop Jr., an iron works manager in Dalson, Cumbria, 75 miles west of the city, according to a news release. The sender is unknown.

As we learned from the presentation by member Bill Ullom at January's meeting, the letter-sheet was the idea of William Mulready. It contained an ornate design and allowed a letter-writer to send a message pre-paid format.

The stamp and the letter-sheet went on sale May 1, 1840 with validity beginning May 6.

Minkus album starts collecting venture


Note: Member Ed Andros recalls his introduction into stamp collecting with a gift at a Christmas.

For Christmas 1959 I was given a 1957 Minkus album probably bought from Higbee's or the May Co. I found one on eBay as my original is long gone.




I'm pretty certain the salesperson showed my mother -- who did the Christmas shopping -the page with Boy Scout merit

badge requirements. I was keen on earning my First Class rank that winter. I wish I could remember who my counselor was -- even what he looked like -- but my mind has dropped that detail.




My favorite item in my collection is a largely intact U.S. Scott 10. It was canceled in Philadelphia on the date that would become my birth day in 1948.

Issued in 1851, the 3-cent stamp depicting George Washington is the oldest item in my U.S. collec-
