March Party is here!

APS Town Hall, two first day ceremonies on tap for the 134th show

The 134th annual March Party is upon us.

The three-day stamp extravaganza features two first-day-of-issue ceremonies, an APS Town Hall meeting and the annual gathering of the Ukrainian Philatelic and Numismatic Society.

"Our club has been planning this year's March Party since last year's show closed. We're happy to welcome UKRAINEPEX 2024 as well as 172 frames of some of the best exhibits of foreign and U.S. material in the country," said Rocco Caponi, show chairman.

The March Party, traditionally Ohio's largest club-sponsored stamp show, will be at the Best Western Plus Hotel, 15471 Royalton Rd, in Strongsville.

This year's cover and postmark theme will be hummingbirds, spinning off of the unveiling of the Garden Delights stamps by the U.S. Postal Service during the show. The four stamps depict a ruby-throated hummingbird flittering around brightly colored flowers and will be introduced Saturday.

Show covers with a commemorative cachet and pictorial post-

mark will be available for \$3.

The United Nations Postal Administration will debut the latest edition of its long-running flag series. Four stamps showing the flags of Lebanon, San Marino, Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela and Yemen will be introduced Friday.

In addition, this year will see the return of a commemorative "cinderella" souvenir sheet marking the long-running show.

A philatelic library is priceless for exhibiting

I have been collecting stamps and covers for more than 78 years and have learned a few things during that time. I tend to collect non-philatelic historical covers and want to mention the values of books for research while researching and developing an exhibit.

To aid me in exhibiting and learning about my collection, I have formed my own philatelic library and collection of nonfiction books written by people who were there.

If I had books on stamp collecting when I first started collecting stamps,

I would not have spent my newspaper route money on fake stamps. I had sent away for a stamp catalogue from a dealer advertising on the back of a comic book. I received a catalogue and bought mint stamps from 1909 and later including the blue paper varieties and imperfs of the Washington-Franklin series and a special delivery stamp.

The special delivery stamp was one of two that look alike except one was printed on watermarked paper. There was a big price difference and I bought the more expensive one.

After the stamp arrived I checked it with my new watermark tray and found the dealer had sent the cheaper stamp instead of the one I ordered. That's when I got a Scott catalogue and found the imperforate stamps had the perforations cut off. What I had bought were fakes.

But that did not deter me.

I later formed collections of several hundred stampless covers da-

ting to the 18th century. The collection included Ohio postmarks, rare Alaska covers dating to the period when the United States bought Alaska from Russia, Korean War covers (the best collection known worldwide), Collins postmarks, Westlake, Ohio, covers (Dover Township), and women in the military during World War II. The collections were turned into exhibits competing at national stamp shows and noncompetitively at local shows.

Books were important in my research in learning what I had in various collections. My library includes books and resources such as: a stampless mail catalogue; territorial Alaska postmarks; Navy Alaska postmarks; trans-Atlantic mail; APO and FPO locations; 10 books (averaging 800 pages each) listing every U.S. Navy ship with locations and descriptions; more than 60 nonfiction books on the Korean War; more than 100 nonfiction books on early Alaska by people who were there; post office

books dating to 1898; government documents, including many that are now declassified, on the Korean War and POW mail, and books written by women who were in the military during World War II.

One of my exhibits appeared in the APS Champion of Champions competition while other received many high and reserve grand awards. I didn't get the top award in the APS competition as a millionaire television preacher took the honors. He flew around the country in his private jet buying stamp and cover collections. He hired a crew to research and mount his exhibits.

Afterward, I talked to his team leader and was told that my exhibit was the only one they were afraid of beating their exhibits. That proves that one does not have to be a very rich person to do well exhibiting nationally. With hard work and knowledge – gained by reading books – one can compete with anyone.

So give exhibiting a try.
