The March Party, traditionally Ohio's largest annual clubsponsored stamp show, will be at the Best Western Plus Hotel, 15471 Royalton Rd., Strongsville.

Show hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Friday and Saturday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Sunday.

Major events kickoff at noon, Friday with the stamp release ceremony for the five Vibrant Leaves

Stotts receives USSS Walter Hopkinson literature award

Jay Stotts has been selected as the Walter W. Hopkinson Memorial Literature Award recipient for his series of articles on the Great



Americans stamp issue published in "The United States Specialist," journal of the U.S. Stamp Society. Published under the heading

"The Great Americans Issue of 1980-1999," the seven-part series began in June and continued through December.

Stotts' articles explored in detail the development of the series that includes dozens of stamps, looking at plate numbers, press positions and types, margin imprints and the variety of printings of many of the individual stamps that were released.

The award has been presented annually since 1954 in honor of Walter W. Hopkinson, plate number specialist and longtime USSS supporter.

Shoults named commissioner For Boston 2026

Greg Shoults, March Party exhibit chairman for the last 10 years, has been named one of three regional U.S. commissioners responsible for handling the transport and care of exhibits at Boston 2026 World Expo.

Widely known for his awardwinning exhibits on the Washing-



ton-Franklin coils, Shoults will be responsible for exhibits from the central U.S.

He was the U.S. commissioner at

CAPEX 2022, the international stamp show held in Toronto. Earlier He also was appointed to Brasiliana 2013 in Rio de Janeiro.

Joining Shoults as commissioners are Chris Lazaroff for the eastern region and Vesma Grinfelds for the western region. Both have served in similar capacities for international shows in recent

stamps. The "forever" stamps feature colorful leaves on trees in the U.S. as seen in the fall: maple, oak, sassafras, aspen and sweetgum. The current post card rate is 56 cents.

Jay Bigalke, editor-in-chief of Linn's Stamp News, is helping plan the ceremony.

Following the stamp release, Bigalke will host a Postcrossing Meetup beginning at 1 p.m.

Gatherings of Postcrossing enthusiasts bring together members of the primarily online community to send post cards randomly to other members in faraway places. In turn, they also receive stamped cards at random for each card sent.

Postcrossing was founded by people who like to receive real mail, not the bulk mail and advertising broadsheets that dominate mail delivery these days.

At 4 p.m., Friday, Garfield-Perry member Alan Hanzl will present "Art on Czechoslovakian Stamps."

On Saturday, the Civil War Stamp Society will hold a series of meetings and programs. The day

opens with a general membership meeting at 9 a.m. Civil War philately expert Trish Kaufmann will present "The Springfield Facsimiles of Confederate Postage Stamps plus a brief TASCO History" at 10 a.m.

Frank Crown will discuss "How the Augusta, Georgia, Post Office opened under Federal Control in 1864 and 1865" at 2 p.m. Following his presentation, as time permits, society members will share some of their prized possessions on screen.

The United States Stamp Society programs include an Executive Committee meeting at 3 p.m., Friday; its board meeting at 11 a.m., Saturday followed by the general membership meeting at 1 p.m.

GP plans to have a special cover with a commemorative cachet and pictorial postmark featuring the Vibrant Leaves theme. They will be available for \$3 throughout the show and by mail to P.O. Box 30338, Middleburg Heights, Ohio, 44130. Please include a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

Club members also will host the New Collectors Room on the show floor where anyone -- children or adults -- can pick up free stamps and covers as well as gain information about stamp collecting as a hobby.

From 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., Sunday, the club will host a "Philatelic Antique Road Show," offering reviews of stamp holdings people may have inherited or been gifted and are unsure of what to do with them.

More than 170 frames of exhibits will feature rarities of U.S. and Civil War philately as well as foreign material.

The show is one of about 25 across the country that is part of the American Philatelic Society World Series of Philately. The show's Grand Award winner will be eligible to compete in the APS Champion of Champions at the Great American Stamp Show August 14-17 in Schaumburg, Illinois, outside of Chicago.

The single-frame Grand Award winner will be eligible to join the annual Single Frame competition Nov. 21-23 at Chicagopex.

All awards from the March Party will be presented at a banquet Saturday evening at the hotel. Tickets are \$65 and will be available at the registration desk.

In addition, 38 dealers will be on hand offering stamps, covers, post cards, supplies and ephemera.

The U.S. Postal Service and the U.N. Postal Administration will have booths as well, offering new stamp and postal stationery issues.

The hotel show rate is \$114 plus tax per night. Reservations can be made by calling the hotel at 440 -238-8800.
