Club artifacts surface Palay donates items for preservation

GP member Myron Palay has been busy digging out materials donate to the club archive.

He has contributed labels prepared for the 1965 March Party, a 1950 lick-and-stick cachet for covers from and newsletters from the 1920s.

The labels are among the most visually striking of the materials provided thus far.

The pane of 14 labels measures 5.25 inches by 8 inches. The labels, produced in two sizes within the pane, were used to promote the emerging use of airmail as an option for mailers.

They feature a mid-20th century airplane and are overprinted: GAR-FIELD-PERRY/Stamp Club Inc./DIAMOND JUBILEE/March 19-20-21, 1965.

The pane was distributed by Ace Stamp Co. to publicize the club's 75th show. Palay expects to contribute

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Israel Touring Stamp Exhibitions

The Israel Touring Stamp Exhibitions were the brainchild of an Israeli stamp dealer couple named Mr. & Mrs. M. Saslowski.



The couple felt that the national exhibitions failed to reach the large mass of people in the smaller towns as well as the large number of

youths in the communities who were interested in stamps but had very little opportunity of meeting others similarly attracted to the hobby.

The slogan which the Saslowskis constantly kept before them in all their work was "Will this benefit our youth and increase their philatelic knowledge?" With this in mind the Saslowskis began the Israel Touring Exhibits in 1950 and

continued the exhibits until May 1960.

Shown here (Figure 1) is the first exhibition cover canceled in Tel Aviv, Israel, on April 30, 1950, and the final exhibition cover cancelled in Lod, Israel on May 6, 1960 (Figure 2). The Lod cover depicts the sports theme and shows a javelin thrower and high jumper.

The cost of operating the exhibits was subsidized by the Saslowskis. Through 1954, and possibly later, the exhibit entrance fee was 6 cents.

At the larger exhibits a special souvenir cover was printed, which was distributed with each entrance ticket. The usual printing for the covers was 3,000, of which about 2,700

were sold. The remaining 300 co-

officials or were destroyed because of poor printing.

Though there were this many covers printed, putting together a complete or nearly complete collection is extremely difficult.

The Traveling Stamp Exhibition consisted of more than 300 frames. It was built along topical lines and included stamps from around the world.

In each community where the exhibit was schedule it was set up with the patronage of the educational and cultural departments of the respective municipalities.

Beginning in September 1952 each cover used as the

entrance ticket for the exhibition bore a 5-pruta tax stamp, being increased to 10 pruta in March 1953. The use of revenue stamps on covers ended in 1954.

Figure 3 shows a cover canceled in Haifa, Israel, on May 6, 1951. It is franked with two tetebeche gutter pairs of the second coin issue of Israel, overprinted in English and Hebrew: "Touring Stamp Exhibition, Haifa, 1951."

Figure 4 is a cover canceled in Petah Tiqwa, Israel, on September 14, 1952. It bears a 5-pruta revenue stamp obliterated with a private exhibition cancelation.

Covers from the Touring Stamp Exhibitions form a most beautiful and colorful collection depicting an interesting segment in Israel's philatelic history.

Czeslaw Slania: Master stamp engraver

Czesław Słania was a Polishborn stamp and banknote engraver who is widely regarded as the most prolific and skilled in the world.

Słania could fit 10 engraved lines in each millimeter, and was a master at rendering complex subjects and portraits.

Overall, he engraved more than 1,000 stamps for at least 32 postal administrations, including the U.S. Postal Service, during a career that spanned longer than a halfcentury. The U.S. stamp was a joint issue with Sweden honoring the Nobel Price centenary in 1983 (Figure 1; U.S. Scott 2036, Sweden Scott 1453).

He was appointed the Royal Court Engraver for Sweden in 1972, and later for Denmark and Monaco.

Słania's first issued stamp was for Poland in March 1951, and his final stamp was a 2005 issue for the United Nations, released shortly before his death.

The stamp image, reproduced on a souvenir sheet from Sweden,

(Figure 2; Scott 2374), is his 1,000th engraving. It was created in 2000 and features a portion of the 17th-century painting "Great Deeds by Swedish Kings." It is noted in the "Guinness Book of World Records" as the largest ever engraved stamp.

Słania was known for including

secret, microscopic marks in his engravings, such as the names of friends on book spines of books or the facades of buildings and details of landscapes.

Some of my favorite Słania stamps include Denmark's design for the 750th anniversary of its flag (Figure 3; Scott 460). The

Danish flag holds the distinction of being the longest in continuous use.

Another favorite also is from Denmark. It is a colorful series illustrating stylized humans participating in individual and team sporting activities (Figure 4, Scott 482-485).
