

A BACKWARD GLANCE

Editor's note: This is the first of several short guest columns on recollections by the author of some G-P events long ago. There will be more memories recounted in future issues of the Perryscope.

In between serious things like talks, the "entertainment" at times was surprises at the annual banquet. Those of us who drove up from the "Rubber City" enjoyed and looked forward to ... "what's next?". There was the time when, as the waiters were clearing the tables, there suddenly occured a great crash of silverware as two waiters with large trays of used silver collided, knives, forks and spoons cascading over and around the startled banqueteers. An argument ensued with both waiters peeling off their jackets and putting on quite a boxing match. You guessed it; the "waiters" were two actors hired by a committee member from a local "stable".

Another occasion called for some serious music. The sound systems were just coming into use and few stages, certainly not the one at the Hollenden, had wiring in place for speakers, microphones, and so forth. For years performers had to be wary of wires laying around, often getting their feet entangled in them. This one particular year a local singer of renown, and an Italian Count, came striding onto the stage, head held high, his spiked Victor Emmanual mustache waxed to fine points, but just as he reached the podium, he tripped on one of those deadly wires and went sliding a good six feet on his nose! The pianist, a giant woman, strode over, picked him up like a rag doll, adjusted his clothing, and while the audience was choking on supressed giggles and laughter, the Count calmly and with great skill gave a wonderful performance of Verdi arias, etc. The audience applauded warmly. But for years afterwards, when someone was trying to recall a date, it would be"... it was the year before the count slid on his nose..." or "...no, it was the year after".

MARCH PARTY NEWS

This will be the last issue of the <u>Perryscope</u> before the March Party so we'll do our best to bring the membership up to date on where we stand at the moment.

The show is scheduled for the weekend of March 19 - 21. Bourse and exhibition will be at the Masonic Auditorium, E. 36th & Euclid Avenue, with the Holiday Inn - Lakeside serving as the headquarters hotel and also the site of the Friday night Wine and Cheese Reception and the Awards Banquet on Saturday evening. This will be the first time we've held the banquet at the show hotel in many years, but we felt the convenience and some modest economy justified the change.

At our last MP committee meeting it was reported that we are within five or six dealers of having a full bourse. Invitations went to some new dealers high on the waiting list.

Although there have been numerous requests to exhibit, application returns have not matched the pace of previous years and only about half the available frames have been

For those who might be coming in from out-of-town and in need of a hotel room, the Club has secured a group rate with the Holiday Inn. Singles are \$67/night and doubles \$72 plus the usual taxes. Set-up day is Thursday, March 18, and the committee could use all the help it can get. If you can spare some time, come on down! We'll begin work about 9 AM.

ON THE EXHIBITION CIRCUIT

We'll stick with this heading for this issue since there were no complaints on its use last time. There is not too much to report again, in spite of the fact that there were some major shows in the months since the last <u>Perryscope</u>.

Vince Lucas won a large vermeil at GENOVA 92, a world thematic stamp exhibition held in mid-September, for his thematic exhibit "The Lepidoptera". That show avoided near disaster on the last day when torrential rains in Italy caused widespread flooding in Genoa which also affected the show site. Fortunately, quick work by the committee saved the day and all exhibits were dismounted without damage.

Gordon Wean captured a gold medal and the A.P.S. pre-1900 medal at INDEPEX 92 with his improved exhibit "Commercial Uses of the Trans Mississippi Issue". Gordon spoke to the Club on November 6 and we were able to see some of the newest additions to this fine study. He has acquired some truly remarkable, and beautiful pieces, since the last time he gave a program to G-P on this subject.

At the Philadelphia National Stamp Exhibition (SEPAD) Bob Stanger walked away with the Reserve Grand Award for "New Hampshire Stampless Covers, 1743 - 1857". Bob has been doing exceptionally well with this fine exhibit during its last few outings.

PHILITEX92, held October 28 - November 2 in Jacob K. Javits Convention Center in New York City, was billed as the First International Philatelic Literature Exhibition in North America. The two recent G-P publications, the Club history and the Cleveland postmarks, were entered in competition. A vermeil medal was awarded to Tom Allen for "19th Century Cleveland, Ohio Postal Markings", and a silver medal was given to Dale Pulver for "The Garfield-Perry Stamp Club, 1890 - 1990: A Brief History". Good awards considering the scope and subject matter of these two works. Associate member Peter McCann won a large silver for his collaboration on "The Postal History of the Cayman Islands", and Simine Short was awarded a silver medal for "Glider Mail". There were, in all, over 600 literature entries in competition.


