MARCH PARTY NEWS

As general chairman Tom Allen is wont to proclaim at each of our show committee meetings, "There will be a March Party this year!" and its time is approaching very rapidly. The latter filled up about ten days before Christmas. Late arriving applications are being noted and applicants are being added to a list of prospective exhibitors for next year.

To recap some of the information we printed in the last Perryscope, the Bureau Issues Association will hold their annual meeting in conjunction with our show. The Locals and Carriers Study Group will be here, too. A special treat this year will be another visit by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing which is celebrating its 100th year of producing U.S. postage stamps. The BEP will bring in a special exhibit entitled, "Stamps That Never Were," a collection of original stamp artwork, models, essays and die essays for stamps that were never issued by the U.S. Postoffice. This five-frame display premiered at the St. Louis show this past September and was a tremendous hit with showgoers. Only selected stamp shows are being favored with this display, so you won't want to miss its only Cleveland showing.

In honor of the centennial of Bureau produced postage stamps, the cachet for this year's show envelope will feature a reproduction of the 1894 Issue 6 c. regular postage stamp bearing the portrait of James A. Garfield (get the connection with our Club?). A special show cancel will also deal with the same theme.

Two noteworthy stamp events in Ohio occur during the period of this **Perryscope.** The Euclid Stamp Club will present **EUPEX '94** the weekend of February 5th & 6th, in Grays Armory, 1234 Bolivar Road, near Prospect and East 14th Street. This downtown show will feature a 24 dealer bourse, exhibits, and the U.S. and U.N. postoffices. Admission is free and a special show cancel will mark the 75th anniversary of east-west airmail service.

COLOPEX '94 will take place April 15 - 17 in Columbus, Ohio. This is a national level show and it will be held at a new location, Franklin County Veterans Memorial, 300 West Broad Street, in downtown Columbus. A new headquarters hotel has been designated, the Holiday Inn City Center, 175 East Town Street.

A BACKWARD GLANCE

Editor's note: This is the fifth in a series of guest columns by Bob, recalling memories of his association with Garfield-Perry dating back to the 1930's. We have enough material for several more editions and we hope members are enjoying these stories.

The 1930's saw a tremendous rise in the number of stamp collectors. The depression sent people in search of something they could do in their newly acquired spare time, especially things that would take their minds off the worries of that period. Many a businessman found stamp collecting a great relaxation. All kinds of hobbies and avocations grew tremendously. I recall a claim that sailboating on Lake Erie had increased 3000% and I am sure stamp collecting could show a similar change. Many collectors became part or full time stamp dealers, with the result that bourses at the annual exhibitions such as the March Party saw a large increase in the number of dealers and offerings. They'd come from a five state area.

Reflecting the financial hard times, there was a increased interest in specialties that didn't require much money to collect. Precancels became a much collected specialty, with a breakdown into further sub-specialties like the Bureau issues, states, and the like. The rapid expansion of airmail routes and the proliferation of first flights with special post office cachets and postmarks attracted many and the small American Air Mail Society soon became a very large society (which prospers to this day). Herbert H. Griffin and the Kingdom brothers were leaders in this activity. These broke down into fascinating specialties like the pioneer flights of the early 1900's, crash covers, and so on.

BACKWARD GLANCE, Continued...

Clayton W. Bedford, a chemist at B.F. Goodrich, spearheaded a large and active interest in plate varieties such as double transfers, shifts, and other indications of extra work on stamp plates. His group called themselves the Shift Hunters and "C.W." had me print some early offset printed "letters" for these specialists. He made up the aluminum plates and wanted just 56 copies, though I urged him to get 100 made as future converts would want them. But no, it was to be just 56, run off on an old hand press converted for the offset rubber blanket printing. C.W. was delighted when one year G-P gave him one of its coveted awards.

C.W. had an alarming habit, at least to the owner of a U.S. collection Bedford might be inspecting. He would allow the ash on his cigar to grow longer and longer while closely examining stamps with a glass held in the same hand. The ash seemed ready to fall at any moment upon the prized album pages with their stamps, while the owner hovered nervously hoping a disaster would not occur. We never saw that incredibly long ash fall on any display and there was much speculation that C.W. somehow engineered it that way. We also suspected that he knew the tension he was creating and was enjoying the concern. Some of us snickered on the way home one time, recalling how one U.S. specialist had been mopping his brow with a handkerchief with the cigar ash suspended over his precious stamps.
