NECROLOGY

It is our sad duty to report the passing of two long time and loyal members of our Club. Both had given noteworthy service to G-P in their active years and we will miss them.

Nicholas J. Johnson, MD - "Doc," as he was known to most of the G-P regulars, died June 15, at his home in Charlottesville, VA after a long bout with cancer. He was 79. Professionally, Johnson was a well known ophthalmologist in the Cleveland area and maintained an office in Parma for many years.

His philatelic interests were, for the most part, focused on postal history. He assembled a number of prize-winning exhibits, notably in the Confederate and Transatlantic fields. Doc was an expert on the complex rules and treaties dealing with 19th century pre-UPU mail between the U.S. and Europe and occasionally gave programs at our meetings on this interesting but confusing subject. Longtime members will recall Dr. Johnson's famous postal history quiz of the mid-1970s. Members expecting entertainment instead found themselves faced with a very difficult written examination as the evening's program. After a few minutes the audience rose up in open revolt and even the well-informed Charlie Ball pronounced it beyond solution in one sitting. Doc then said it could be taken home as an open book quiz!?

Doc joined G-P in 1963 (member #826), served in all the offices and was elected president for 1970 & 71. It was during his second term that he invited the Club to his farm in Richfield for a summer picnic. The Johnsons hosted the Club again in 1977 together with the Collectors Club of Akron, of which Doc also served a term as president.

In 1991, the Johnsons left Ohio and moved to Charlottesville, VA. He would occasionally drop in at the Club when visiting the Cleveland area. Those of us who knew him were especially happy to see him again at the 1996 March Party. It turned out to be his last visit to a Club event. He was in the group photo on the front page of the last *Perryscope* (front standing row, fourth from left).

John S. Whittlesey - Only two days after Doc Johnson's passing (June 17) another loyal G-P member died. We all knew him as Jack, and when he left us he was only a week short of his 92nd birthday. He enjoyed remarkably good health most of his long life but also succumbed to cancer which ran its course rather quickly.

Jack joined G-P a second time in 1944 (he was a member from '34-36) and continued uninterrupted membership until he died. He was very active in Club affairs for many years and served his term at the helm of G-P in 1957. In the later years of his active participation he often did the publicity for the March Parties.

Jack's collecting interests spanned a broad spectrum. Early on, he formed a prize-winning collection of Brazil. This he later sold and began concentrating on postal history. His favorite topic was cancellations and markings connected to the industrial growth of the U.S. -- town marks with the words: factory, forge, foundry, furnace, mill(s), and so forth. He became so absorbed in this specialty that he would write the various postmasters of extant postoffices seeking current cancellations and historical details of the locations. He and his first wife Mary often visited the small towns represented in his postmark collection.

Jack was a member of a number of other philatelic organizations, APS, CC of NY, Postal History Society, Pennsylvania P.H. Society, and Empire State P.H.S. He was one of the founding members of the Ohio P.H. Society and designed the logo adopted by this group. Jack was very proud of his philatelic and historical society associations and in his will provided bequests for many of them. He left \$4,000 to Garfield-Perry to be used as the Club saw fit.

MARCH PARTY NEWS

Our 1997 107th anniversary March Party will take place the weekend of March 21 - 23. As all members should know by now, it is one of the great national level stamp shows of the U.S. and brings to Cleveland some of the nation's most renowned stamp dealers and some of the country's most outstanding collectors and exhibits. The venue is the same as it has been for several years -- Masonic Auditorium at E. 36th and Euclid. The Holiday Inn, Lakeside at 1111 Lakeside Avenue, will be headquarters hotel and site of some of the social events.

For those of you who might be contemplating an exhibit, <u>do not</u> delay your decision. We generally fill up by the end of the year and that's not too far away. The prospectus and application forms are now ready, and can be had by dropping a card or note to Dale Pulver, 7725 Beaver Creek Drive, Mentor, OH 44060-7121. He will see that you get one by return mail.

In the last *Perryscope*, we mentioned that this would be the last year for the Club's glass fitted, 12-page frames. So, if you want to be an exhibitor who showed your really good stuff under glass this is your last opportunity. Starting 1998, we will use the aluminum 16-page frames that have become more or less standard at the major shows. These frames contain lightweight, clear plastic, not glass. For those interested, we have what we believe to be a first class judging panel: Ann Triggle (chair), Paul A. Larson, Roger G. Schnell, MD, Phillip J. Stager, and Jay B. Stotts. Our apprentice this year will be Diane D. Bohret.

Additionally, the Postal History Society and the Ohio Postal History Society will hold annual meetings at the show. There will be seminars for those thirsting for philatelic knowledge, and the usual Friday evening wine and cheese party for those thirsting for a good time. Check the next *Perryscope* with further announcements. But do act now if you wish to exhibit!

IN THE WINNERS CIRCLE

There hasn't been too much action in the exhibition arena since the last issue, but we can report a few results from CAPEX 96 and Stampshow.

At CAPEX Bob Markovits and Dick Winter won gold medals. Bob showed his U.S. Officials and Dick had his U.S.-France mails by steamship. In the Large Vermeil category there were three G-P winners: Doc Carr with his British Columbia, Jay Stotts with his fourth Bureau issue, and Vince Lucas with "Coffee." Phil Stager won a Vermeil with his retitled topical, "Ailments of Venus." And finally, Peter McCann took a Large Silver with his Tristan da Cunha postal history exhibit.

At Stampshow, four G-Pers were represented in the C of C competition: **Peter McCann** had his "British Virgin Islands Postal History"; **Clyde Jennings** - "The Half-A Collection"; **Bob Markovits** - "U.S. Officials 1873-1884"; and **Phil Stager** with "Ailments of Venus."

In the open competition, Jay Stotts took Gold and two special prizes, APS Medal of Excellence, 1900-1940 and BIA Statue of Freedom Award, for his "Fourth Bureau Issue." Ken Lawrence had a non-competitive exhibit, "Interesting and Unusual U.S. First Days and Earlier Usages," and Clyde Jennings was party to a Display Class exhibit, "A B-I-I-I-G Bellyache" which received a bronze award.

EDITOR'S CORNER

As I begin this, the weather is definitely fall-like -- cool temperatures, overcast skies, and a bit of light rain. I'm confident we're still in for some lovely fall days, but today is reminiscent of the kind of day when I head for the stamp den. And fall is traditionally the start of a new cycle in the stamp world; the fall shows (see list), a new round of stamp auctions, and improved attendance at club meetings.

We have, I believe, a good lineup of programs for the fall/winter quarter. Starting in mid-October, we have a string of speakers on a broad spectrum of topics that should appeal to to all serious collectors. We have also reserved some of the fine, APS slide programs based on interests expressed by several members. And finally, there are a couple of audience participation nights that everyone seems to enjoy.

Last month we noted the impending purchase of new exhibition frames and the sale of our old ones. I mentioned that our 12-page wood frames were acquired for the 1954 March Party; I made a mistake -- it was for the 1953 March Party. So, some of them are one year older than reported, but none the less serviceable. In any event, we will be disposing of the old ones in one form or another and if any reader knows of a club that might be interested, please have them get in touch with us. Prices have not yet been established but they will be reasonable, and certainly far, far below replacement cost. Availability -- after the 1997 March Party. Incidentally, Linn's gave us a nice little write-up about the frame situation in their July 29, issue. Did you see it?

The G-P Philatelic Library was a matter of discussion at a recent board meeting. For newer members who may not know, this is a large collection of philatelic books and journals originally owned by our Club, that was turned over to the Cleveland Public Library in 1948 for safe keeping. Since that time it has grown from donations and CPL purchases. Originally housed in the fine arts section, it was moved to the business department (old Plain Dealer Building) and when that was to be razed for the new annex, it was moved again -- into storage. We assume that when the new annex is complete, it will again be available for use. Under the terms of the original donation, the collection can be accessed on site by anyone, but only G-P members can check out books. It was agreed we should endeavor to learn CPL's plans for the collection. Over the years several members have served as ex-officio Club librarians. Perhaps we should find a new one. Any volunteers out there? It is a good resource and a pity it isn't used more.
