

Although the owner of a vast collection of this material, he rarely exhibited competitively. But he was always willing to share his knowledge with other collectors.

Jerry was a regular visitor to our March Parties and a good friend of our Club. We'll miss him.

G-P MEMBERS
SCORE WELL AT
PACIFIC 97

In comparing the Palmares from PACIFIC 97 with our latest membership list, we find that on the whole, G-P members did rather well in the competitions at that world scale stamp show.

Robert L. Markovits won a Large Gold for his exhibit, "The United States Officials 1873 - 1884, A Specialized Showing." Bob was also awarded a special prize for his display.


Dick Winter also garnered a Large Gold for his specialized showing of "U.S. - France Mails by Steamship: 1838 to General Postal Union." And Dick, too, was the recipient of a special prize for his efforts.

The Club had three winners in the Large Vermeil category:

Jay Stotts won a LV medal for his specialized study, "United States: Rate Usages of the Fourth Bureau Issue." As most of us know, Jay has worked hard on this collection for many years and is a recognized authority on the subject. Jay authored an acclaimed series of articles on this issue for the BIA journal a few years back.

Tom Allen also took a LV for his exhibit on a local theme, "Cleveland (To 1868)." Tom showed this collection in its pared down version for PACIFIC 97 at the last March Party where he captured the Reserve Grand and a bunch of other awards. He, too, has worked hard on this study for many years. And it is good to see that international judges will give such a fine reward to an in-depth study of narrow geographic scope.

And finally, **Dave Wessely** received an LV for "The Bechuanalands," another exhibit we have seen at our March Party competitions. Dave was a last minute entry, being called in after other accepted entries withdrew from competition. We believe this is the first time Dave has

competed internationally, and what a fine result for his efforts!

Our Florida escapee, **Phil Stager**, competed in the thematic category and won a Vermeil medal for his "Ailments of Venus."

And Blake Myers won a Large Silver for "Trans-Oceanic Mail - The United States and the Confederacy During the Civil War, 1861 - 1865."

In the Literature section, our new member Bill Welch received a Gold Medal for his editorship of *The American Philatelist* and a Vermeil Medal for *Philatelic Literature Review*.
