NECROLOGY FRED W. HIBBEN 1923 - 1998

With genuine sadness we announce that our old friend, Fred W. Hibben, passed away suddenly on September 5 in South Carolina. Fred had been a member of our club since 1948 and carried membership number 941. Fred was born in Lakewood and grew up in Cleveland. He served with the U.S. Army in WWII and attended the University of Pennsylvania. He was employed as yardmaster by the NYCRR and retired in 1986. By then it was called ConRail. Fred had many amusing stories about his days with the railroads.

For most of us he was the nearest thing there was to a permanent fixture at the March Party, boasting he had been a bourse dealer since age 15 and never missed — a span of about 60 years. He operated under the business name of Ace Stamp Co. and carried a very comprehensive stock of 20th century U.S. stamps. He seemed to have an uncanny knack for finding ample sources of popular items such as the scarce plate number coils that became the rage in recent years.

He was the consummate raconteur when it came to philatelic matters. A couple of years ago Fred gave a program on his memories of our Club. Luckily, we videotaped that talk and so have a record of Fred's humorous way with our past.

We will miss seeing him in his usual spot on the corner facing the USPS sales counter.

Local members opted out of the competition arena for the most part during the past several months. As far as we can determine, the only members competing in Stampshow were out-of-towners, but they did so at the highest level. Dr. John Robertson was in the Champion of Champions competition with a relatively new exhibit "Cross Border Mail: United States and British North America to 1897" as was Ann Triggle with her "CYMRU (Wales)," a version of which we saw in Cleveland several years ago.

In other results we have not previously reported: **John Robertson** took the reserve grand at Plymouth Show with his U.S. Free Franks, and **Dr.**

Frank Shively won a gold with his Yukon Law Revenue stamp exhibit. Member Bob Markovits has been doing well on the circuit with his one-frame exhibits, of which he has several. At NOJEX 98 (May 23-25), his "The 5¢ New York City Airmail" won a platinum and best of show; a gold medal went to his "Garfield Stationery"; and vermeil was awarded to his "The 80¢ Hawaii Air Mail Issue."

Speaking of one-frame exhibits, your editor received a show gold and a MEPSI bronze at MEP-SIRREY 98 for his "Anotado" exhibit at Monterrey, Mexico in April.

At OKPEX 98, Bill Jones took a vermeil medal and the topical award for his "Merit Badges for Boy Scout Eagle Award as Shown Philatelically." This exhibit was at our March Party and seems to have been under-appreciated by that jury.

Members attending AIRPEX the weekend of September 25 reported back that Jay Stotts took the reserve grand with his exhibit of the fourth bureau issue. Lacking the palmares for this show, we cannot list the exact title.
