FIRST DAY CEREMONY HIGHLIGHTS MARCH PARTY '99

bout 200 collectors and curious on-lookers attended a first day ceremony at the Masonic hall Saturday, March 13, at 1 PM at which a new 33¢ self-adhesive Classroom Flag stamp was unveiled. The ceremony marked the midpoint of a very successful March Party weekend.

The design of the new stamp follows a familiar theme with a U.S. flag and a piece of Americana. This time the background consisted of a schoolroom chalkboard displaying upper and lower

case letters of the alphabet and the stamp's denomination.

In the photo above, we show three members of the Cleveland Postoffice staff who participated in the event: Tina Grabovez, local philatelic representative, Jordan Small, Cleveland Postmaster, and Victor Dubina, corporate relations and media rep for the region.

There was very little advance notice on this ceremony. The stamp was originally scheduled for introduction in April at another location but Continued on Page 2.



humble view. After some scary, and unsettled weather at the beginning of the month it finally settled down and we were able to slip through the weekend without serious incident. In fact, it was just cold enough to discourage outdoor activities and may have helped attendance, at least the first two days.

Set-up day went smoothly, thanks to plenty of help from willing members. There were some minor problems with our new frames, but once erected, mounting the exhibits is a breeze. I really like the new frames from that standpoint, but I am not happy with the shoddy way they were manufactured. Hopefully, we can do something about that.

It was another year for top quality exhibits. As

you will note from the Winner's Circle, the judges seemed to sense something special about this group of collections. They awarded 18(!) gold medals, four vermeils and two each of silver and silver-bronze. There were no bronze awards.

This is the largest number of golds ever given at a March Party. The previous high was 15. On my quality point index I have been keeping since we became a national show in 1981, it registered 4.46, again the highest index ever. An index of 5.00 would be a perfect score — all exhibits receiving a gold.

Breakdown on Sunday went well. In fact, we had more volunteers than we could efficiently use until the exhibits were dismounted. This was the second year with the new frames and we find that it takes a little bit longer to clear everything away and stack in the storage room. Part of that is the complexity of the frame set-up and part, I guess, is the fact that some of us are beginning to slow down.

My personal thanks to all who helped with the hard work of setting up and tearing down. It would be impossible to stage our show without this assistance.

PREVAILS IN A

STRONG FIELD

TO WIN GRAND

MARCH PARTY 99 After a string of seven consecutive reserve grand awards, our Texas member Jay Stotts finally carried home the best of our show award with his "United States: The Fourth Bureau Issue, 1922 - 1938." Jay has been working on this study for almost 20 years and has it in a truly world class competitive state. In addition to the Grand Award, he received a gold medal, G-P's Best U.S. and Members awards, and the BIA Medal of Freedom. He will represent our Club in the Champion of Champions competition at Stampshow '99 in August.

The reserve grand award went to Paul A. Larsen for "Federal Issues of the Leeward Islands, 1890 - 1911." He also received the Donald Goertz Award for the best foreign exhibit.

Gold medals also went to: Jonathan W. Rose for "United States General Issues, 1847 - 1860, Inclusive"; John L. Robertson, M.D. for his "U.S. and B.N.A. Cross Border Mails, 1845 to U.P.U."; Charles J. Ekstrom III for "Federal Migratory Bird Hunting Stamps," also the APS Medal of Excellence for 1940 - 1980; G. Adolph Ackerman who showed "For the Red Air Fleet - Soviet Air Fleet Semi-Official Stamps/Labels," also APS Research and AAPE Creativity awards; Ronald E. Strawser for "Postal Cards of the Belgian Congo"; Joan M. Klimchalk for "Santa Claus: A Living Legend," also GP Award for best thematic; William J. Ainsworth for "Lincoln in Shades of Carmine and Black," also US Philatelic Classics Society medal; Ann M. Triggle for "British Guiana Postal Stationery"; Murray A. Abramson for "The US 1922 Definitive Series: A Study of Rates and Uses," also APS Medal of Excellence, 1900 - 1940; James Kotanchik for "US Post Office Seals, 1872 - 1970"; Van Koppersmith

for "Mobile, Alabama Postal History Outside of the Union"; William H. Bauer for "Colorado Territory, 1858 - 1876," also APS Medal of Excellence for pre-1900 material; Kenneth Kutz of "Untold Wealth - Canada's Mineral Heritage," and finally, Alfred F. Kugel for "Allied Intervention in Russia, 1918 - 1925."

Vermeil medals were awarded to: Richard H. Parker for "Ohio Postal History, 1790 to 1816"; John W. Allen for "Liberties: The US 1954 Definitive Series on Cover," also AAPE Gold Award of Honor; William J. Hart for "United States Single Postal Cards Used Internationally"; and Lucian Joel for "Syncopated Perforations of the Netherlands."

Silver medals were given to Rocco Caponi for his "2¢ Circular Die Envelope Issue of 1915" and to Mary Turner for her "Christmas Angels."

Silver-bronze medals went to: Frederick E. Lutt for his "Leeward Islands, King George VI Definitives" and Charles J. Waterstradt for "Christmas Around the World on Postal Materials."

In the One-Frame category there were three winners: Phil Stager took the first prize with "Dates - The Genus Phoenix"; second went to Walter Krasowski for "Varieties of the 1932 3¢ Overprint on the 2¢ Arch Issue of Canada"; and third place was won by Dale Pulver with "Mexico: Making the 2 Reales Rate, 1856 - 1868."

These awards and the special GP awards were painted terra cotta reproductions of Great Lakes lighthouses.




